NVRDC Named 'One of the Best' Nonprofits by the Catalogue for Philanthropy

WASHINGTON, DC (June 14, 2021) - After undergoing a rigorous review process conducted by a team of 170+ local community advocates, <u>Network for Victim Recovery of DC</u> (NVRDC) has been chosen by <u>Catalogue for Philanthropy: Greater Washington</u> (CFPGW) to be part of the Class of 2021-22 as a critical local nonprofit. Potential donors can be confident that the nonprofits in the Catalogue are worthy of their support. NVRDC provides survivors of all types of crime in DC with free, holistic and trauma-informed advocacy and legal services. NVRDC aims to help survivors achieve justice as they see it by presenting all the options available to them.

This year, the Catalogue's volunteer review team helped select 87 nonprofits to feature in the print edition, almost half of which are new to the Catalogue this year. Over 70% of the organizations are women-led, and over 40% are BIPOC-led. The network now includes 400+ vetted nonprofits working in the arts, education, environment, and human services sectors throughout Greater Washington.

"People want to get involved in their community—they want to make a difference, close to home. Based on our rigorous review process, we believe that NVRDC is a critical local nonprofit in our region," said Matt Gayer, Co-Executive Director of the Catalogue for Philanthropy.

The Catalogue believes in the power of small nonprofits to spark big change and to continue to further that positive change, working each day to lift up, strengthen, and enrich our local community.
