NVRDC's Executive Director Receives 2019 EXCEL Award

Washington, DC - Bridgette Stumpf, co-founder and Executive Director of Network for Victim Recovery of DC, is one of three winners of the Center for Nonprofit Advancement's EXCEL Award. The Excellence in Chief Executive Leadership (EXCEL) Award recognizes and spotlights outstanding chief executives among nonprofits in our region. The competition focuses on achievement in the areas of innovation, motivation, community building, ethical integrity and strategic leadership.

Ms. Stumpf, joins, Stephen Glaude, President and CEO of the Coalition for Nonprofit Housing and Economic Development, and Hugo Mogollon, Executive Director of Community Foodworks as winners of the 2019 EXCEL Award.

"As I aim to create leaders for change in our field, generally, this award is confirmation that NVRDC is modeling an example for others to follow in pushing leadership approaches that drive innovation, creative solutions, integrity and community building," Ms. Stumpf said.
